UNICEF OutRight 2025 Campaign: A Call for Change - Save Our Trees!

This year, as part of the UNICEF OutRight 2025 campaign, our children are becoming change-makers by learning how the OutRight initiative encourages children to call on decision-makers to act on the issues that matter most to them.

The children chose a local issue close to their hearts: the preservation of the trees on the Brede Parish recreational ground. Over the past years, some of the oldest and largest trees in the area have been cut down, and unfortunately, the Brede Broad Oak — the iconic oak tree that the area is named after — is set to be removed on Tuesday and Wednesday next week.

To help the children better understand the council's decision, we were fortunate to have Cllr Stephen Hampson, Chair of Brede Parish Council, visit the school on Thursday. He shared information about why these trees are being taken down and answered questions from our Rights Respecting Schools Steering Group. The children expressed their concerns about the impact this decision will have on the school and local community and raised several important points, including:

- The loss of the Oak tree, which provides much-needed shade, particularly as summers grow hotter.
- The tree's role as a habitat for insects, wildlife, birds, and bats, which will be disrupted.
- The joy children find in climbing the trees, and the fact that this would be the second Oak tree of this size removed in recent years.

The children also asked whether alternatives had been explored, such as finding ways to safely preserve the tree, or if the council had sought advice from specialists or artists to find more creative solutions. They wanted to know if there were any other options, like keeping the tree as a feature within the community, even if it needed to be made safe.

This is a powerful example of how children can take a stand and advocate for what they believe in. We are proud of their efforts to engage with local decision-making and raise awareness about the importance of protecting our natural environment. Despite the loss of another tree next week, the children will continue with their campaign after half term and are currently contacting the Tree Council and National Trust to seek their thoughts and expertise on what options they can suggest moving forward.

Cllr Hampson said he would relay the children's requests, concerns and comments back to the councils committee. We hope that the council will consider the children's perspectives carefully as they move forward with their decisions. The children will continue to liaise with UNICEF UK, sharing regular updates on the campaign. Thank you to everyone involved for making your voices heard!






Amaze Neurodevelopmental (ND) Family Support
