Potential transmission to clinically vulnerable staff and pupils Guidance is available in the Actions for schools during the Coronavirus Outbreak	All members of school community	Communicate with any parents of clinically vulnerable pupils to inform them: All CEV pupils should attend their school unless they are one of the very small number of pupils under paediatric or other specialist care and have been advised by their GP or clinician not to attend. Pupils who live with someone who is CEV should continue to attend school as normal. Clinically extremely vulnerable (CEV) people are advised, as a minimum, to follow the same guidance as everyone else. It is important that everyone adheres to this guidance, but CEV people may wish to think particularly carefully about the additional precautions they can continue to take. Further information can be found in the guidance on protecting people who are CEV from COVID-19. 2.	Risk of ongoing contamination from pupils and staff	All members of the school community	It is no longer necessary to keep pupils in consistent groups or 'bubbles'. Assemblies can resume and there is no longer a need to make alternative arrangements to avoid mixing at lunch. Music and PE lessons can continue as normal. However, the school will ensure that control measures are in place and well communicated: Hand hygiene: Frequent and thorough hand cleaning is regular practice. The school ensures that pupils clean their hands regularly with soap and water or hand sanitiser. Respiratory hygiene: The 'catch it, bin it, kill it' approach continues to be adhered to in school.	5	3	15		4	3	12

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			Cleaning: Areas and equipment are cleaned daily with a particular focus on frequently touched surfaces The school follows the government guidance on cleaning of non-healthcare settings. Ventilation: The school will be well ventilated with windows and doors opened to create air flow.* *(CO2 monitors will be provided to all state-funded education settings from September, so staff can quickly identify where ventilation needs to be improved. More information will be added to this RA once the monitors arrive.) Any poorly ventilated spaces will be identified in the risk assessment and steps taken to improve fresh air flow in these areas, giving particular consideration to when holding events where visitors such as parents are on site. 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		Contingency plan: We would revert back to our much stricter January 2021 Covid-19 Risk Assessment for as long as DfE recommends - with social distancing, class bubbles, staggered breaks and start/finish times, staff mask wearing in communal areas and reduced numbers of staff in rooms. No music lessons that involve singing and dancing inside. Full school assemblies would be stopped. Full details can be found on the January 2021 risk assessment. The contingency plan outlines extra action to take if the number of positive cases substantially increases. This is because it could indicate transmission is happening in the setting. The thresholds, detailed below, can be used by settings as an indication for when to seek public health advice if they are concerned. For most education and childcare settings, whichever of these thresholds is reached first: • 5 children, pupils, students or staff, who are likely to have mixed closely, test positive for COVID-19 within a 10-day period; or 10% of children, pupils, students or staff who are likely to have mixed closely test positive for COVID-19 within a 10-day period							

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		The school will call the dedicated advice service who will escalate the issue to the local health protection team, where necessary and advise if any additional action is required, such as implementing elements of your contingency plan.							
		The school has communicated to parents that pupils should not come into school if they have symptoms or have had a positive test result.							
		Anyone who develops COVID-19 symptoms, will be sent home and told to follow public health advice.							
		If a pupil is awaiting collection, they will be left in a room on their own if possible and safe to do so. A window will be opened for fresh air ventilation if possible. Appropriate PPE will also be used if close contact is necessary in that time.

		Testing							
		Staff will undertake twice weekly home tests whenever they are on site until the end of							

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		September, when this will be reviewed by Government and updated. The school have communicated to parents that staff and pupils with a positive LFD test result should self-isolate in line with the stay at home guidance for households with possible or confirmed coronavirus (COVID-19) infection. They will also need to get a free PCR test to check if they have COVID-19. Whilst awaiting the PCR result, the individual should continue to self-isolate. Additional information on PCR test kits for schools and further education providers is available. The school will maintain its capacity to deliver high-quality remote education for the next academic year, for pupils who have tested positive for Covid-19 are at home self-isolating. Also for pupils who are abroad and facing challenges to return due to COVID-19 travel restrictions, for the period they are abroad. Some pupils may be experiencing a variety of emotions in response to the COVID-19 pandemic, such as anxiety, stress or low mood. The school will access useful links and sources of support on promoting and supporting mental health and wellbeing in schools.				The government recommend schools do not go on any international visits before the start of the autumn term. From the start of the new school term, schools can go on international visits that have previously been deferred or postponed and organise new international visits for the future. Bubbles in wraparound provision are not required but the measures around cleaning, hand washing, and ventilation will be in place.			

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		Educational visits can resume with risk assessments in place which include systems of controls at the destination. Check the provider has assessed the risk and implemented appropriate control measures.* (Any attendance restrictions should be reflected in the visits risk assessment and setting leaders will consider carefully if the educational visit is still appropriate and safe.) *The school will ensure there is adequate financial protection in place in the event of a COVID-19 cancellation. The school will also consult with its insurers to find out if there are any COVID-19 exceptions. Schools will continue to offer wraparound provision, such as breakfast and after-school clubs, for those children eligible to attend school to help support the children of critical workers. Face Coverings The school has a small contingency supply of face masks available. (Children of primary school age and early years children are advised not to wear face coverings.) The school has a process for managing face coverings in school that is clearly communicated.				Face Coverings Although face coverings are no longer required in classrooms or communal areas in schools for pupils, staff and visitors, the contingency plan will acknowledge that, if there is an outbreak face coverings should temporarily be worn in communal areas or classrooms.			

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			(Safe wearing of face coverings requires cleaning of hands before and after touching – including to remove or put them on – and the safe storage of them in individual, sealable plastic bags between each use.)							
			Leaders will ensure that school has enough tissues and bins available to support pupils and staff to follow the 'catch it, kill it, bin it' approach. (Reinforce routines of using a tissue to cough or sneeze and bins for tissue waste.)							
			We ensure all the usual building checks are undertaken to make the school safe.

Risk of transmission from pupils and staff who have been in contact with the virus and/or are showing signs of having the virus (a new, continuous cough or a high temperature)	All members of the school community	*The PCR test kits sent to schools can be used in the exceptional circumstance that an individual becomes symptomatic, and schools believe they may have barriers to accessing testing elsewhere. It is for schools to determine how to prioritise the distribution of their test kits in order to minimise the impact of the virus on the education of their pupils.* PCR kits can be given directly to staff or parents and carers collecting a child who has developed symptoms at school. If anyone in the school becomes unwell with a new and persistent cough or a high temperature, or has a loss of or change in, their normal sense of taste or smell (anosmia), they will be sent home and advised to follow guidance for households with possible or confirmed coronavirus (COVID-19) infection, If a pupil is awaiting collection, they will be left in a room on their own if possible and safe to do so. A window will be opened for fresh air ventilation if possible. Appropriate PPE should also be used by staff if close contact is necessary.
